PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Historically, the Board of Examiners of Architects has been hampered in the enforcement of the Architect's Law because of the lack of a full-time investigator working for the Board. In 1989 the Board was appropriated funding for a full-time investigator and since that time the Board has reviewed up to 75 matters a year. The cases mostly consist of the unauthorized practice of architecture, plan stamping or a combination of both.

The investigator visits building departments throughout the state reviewing applications and documents submitted for building permit approval. If a project is submitted without being authored by an architect, the person preparing the documents will be requested to meet with the Board Staff to resolve the matter. In the case of unlicensed practice, the person preparing the documents is offered the opportunity to enter into a settlement agreement whereby they agree to comply with the law and, essentially, cease and desist in the further practice of architecture. If there is a repeat offense, the next action by the Board would be to seek an injunction and/or file a complaint with the prosecuting attorney for criminal action.

The Board has reviewed cases where an unlicensed person has prepared the documents and those documents have been sealed by a professional engineer, often in an unrelated field such as chemical, aeronautical, etc. In such matters, the engineers are referred to the Board of Registration for Professional Engineers and Surveyors for any disciplinary action that might be warranted.

Through the efforts of the Office of the Attorney General, an Architect/Engineer Committee has been organized to review matters involving incidental practice. The cases are sorted out by the Committee and sent to the proper Board (architectural or engineering) with a recommendation for further action. The Committee is comprised of two architects and two engineers with support from the Board Administrators and the Assistant Attorneys General representing each of the Boards. The Committee meets on call, approximately three or four times per year.

I believe the arrangement is beneficial in protecting the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of Ohio and should lead to a better built environment.

SETTLEMENT AGREEMENTS

Since the publication of the Board's first Newsletter three years ago, one of the regular features has been a listing of enforcement activities. Most of these involve "settlement agreements" which some people seem to view as a mere slap on the wrist. Under Ohio law the Board has two means for resolving unlicensed practice matters. The Board can apply to a court for the purpose of having the person enjoined from further practice and it can file an affidavit with the prosecuting attorney for criminal prosecution. Either of these are long and drawn out and are very costly. The Board has been more concerned about obtaining compliance than obtaining injunctions or sending someone to jail. Injunctions require quite a bit of paperwork and the process can take as much as six months to a year before a decision is handed down. Injunctions, as a first step in obtaining compliance, represent a rather large step and one that is not always going to have a satisfactory result. First offense cases may be whisked away with a question about the person's knowledge of wrongdoing and a promise not to do it again. If a person violates a settlement agreement and an injunction

is sought, it is far more likely that it will be dealt with more seriously in the courts. Violation of an injunction would result in contempt charges against the person and that can be more extreme than the criminal charges.

A typical settlement agreement is a contract between the alleged violator and the Board. Like any contract, both parties must contribute something of value and, although the contract can go beyond what penalties might be described in the law for criminal sentences, they seldom do. The Board will generally offer to not seek prosecution or injunction in return for which the respondent will agree to cease and desist in the practice of architecture or holding themselves out to practice architecture in the future. Agreements have also required closing of offices, removal of telephones, non-admission to the examination and other penalties for the alleged violations. The Board has had remarkable success with this program which, in many instances, has been a superb educational tool.

PLAN STAMPING

One of the more serious acts committed by a professional is what is commonly known as plan stamping. Ordinarily we think of this in the context of an architect stamping a set of documents prepared by an unlicensed person, a practice which is unlawful and will result in severe disciplinary action. There is another practice within the profession which is also illegal but often not thought of as plan stamping. An architect may, for example, engage a HVAC contractor (not a licensed engineer) to design a heating/air conditioning system for a building which the architect has designed and seal the drawings as his/her own. This is plan stamping. Such practice undermines the regulatory system. In cooperation with the Board of Regulation for Professional Engineers and Surveyors, the Board will make every effort to halt this practice.

Did you know that the Ohio Architectural Practice Act makes no exceptions for the practice of architecture to permit unlicensed persons to design any building type, including single family residences, except for their own use?

EXAM RESULTS

In June 1993, the Board administered the ARE to 428 candidates. Of these candidates, 125 new architects were registered. The 466 candidates sat for 2,427 exam divisions and 1,612 divisions were passed for an overall passing rate of 66%.

The following chart compares the passing rate of Ohio candidates with the passing rate for our NCARB Region (Ohio, Indiana, Iowa, Illinois, Kentucky, Minnesota, Michigan, Missouri and Wisconsin) and with the passing rate of all jurisdictions administering the exam, including all of the United States, most of Canada, the Virgin Islands, Puerto Rico, Guam, Bermuda and the Northern Marianas.

EXAMINATION NEWS

You may have heard by now that the Building Design division of the Architect Registration Examination has an entirely new format introduced with the June, 1994 administration of the exam. Since the beginning of architectural registration in Ohio in 1931, the Building Design test portion of the registration examination has been a single design problem. The Building Design has been changed to multiple vignettes, similar to the Site Design. The six vignettes are designed to cover a broader range of subjects, reduce the testing time and produce more reliable scores. These will be administered in the present paper-and-pencil format through June 1996. Beginning in early 1997, these vignettes, along with all other divisions of the ARE, will be computer administered.

The familiar 12-hour building design exam requires candidates to demonstrate certain knowledge, skills and abilities but does not evaluate each candidate against the same criteria for performance of the individual tasks that make up the examination. For example, candidates are required to integrate a structural system with their design of the building. When being graded for technical competence, the problem of integrating a structural system has a different level of difficulty for each candidate because each candidate has determined the building form into which the structural system will be integrated. Because of the differing abilities of the candidates and the different solutions, they create their own structural integration problems. Thus evaluation against a uniform level of performance is difficult.

It is important that the Board issue registration only to those candidates who have demonstrated entry-level skills. By having each candidate solve the same problem, it will be easier to make that determination. This doesn't mean that a candidate without good planning skills will find it easier to pass a vignette-based exam as it may be found that those without the abilities to perform in one area may also lack abilities in other areas.

In 1994, Division C: Building Design was administered on Thursday, June 16 and will be given again on Tuesday, December 13. Candidates will be given 12 continuous hours to complete the six vignettes which will make up this portion of the examination. Although recommended times for completing each vignette will be given, it is up to each candidate to schedule his or her own time. The entire series of vignettes has been designed to be completed in 10 hours, but candidates will continue to have 12 hours of testing time.

The six vignettes administered in the June, 1994 exam included the following: Block Diagram, Schematic Design (Floor Plans), Structural Plan, Mechanical and Electrical Plan, Building Section and Accessibility. Descriptions of each of these vignettes are provided in the NCARB *Circular of Information No. 2* and the 1994 edition of NCARB's *Architect Registration Examination Handbook*, which includes examples of the new vignettes.

PROPOSED RULES

The Board has proposed changes to the rules governing the practice of architecture and there will be a hearing on those rules on August 19, 1994 in Room 410, The Arcade, Cleveland. The purpose of the revisions is to establish a new format for the rules which is easier to use. This new format will include the following sections: Administration, Registration, Practice, Meetings and Records. There are also three changes in content. The Board is proposing a deadline of January 1, 2000 for making application under the education and experience requirements in effect prior to January 1, 1994. Also, the rules pertaining to the use of the seal have been clarified and an exemption established for the intern development program (IDP) for certain situations where additional education has been obtained and the IDP would have unreasonably extended the intern period. Copies of the proposed rules are available upon request from the office of the Board.
